August Talks

5th August

Alastair Olver

Our first talk this month was given by our own member, Alastair Olver in which he described the coast-to-coast Wainwright Walk he and his wife Julie undertook earlier this year. In all, they covered 192 miles in twelve days. They used a company which specialises in organising these types of treks, with overnight stops planned and their luggage transported to the next hotel in readiness for a well-deserved break.

They began their trek in the Lake District, setting off from St Bees in Cumbria and finishing at Robin Hood Bay in North Yorkshire. The challenging and iconic walk passed through the Lake District; the Yorkshire Dales, and the North York Moors national parks. Alastair highlighted his walk with many photographs of Julie near a wide variety of signposts discovered along the way, as well as photos of the range of differing landscapes they encountered along the route. It is fair to say that despite occasional deviations from the route, Alastair and Julie demonstrated exceptional fitness and excellent navigation skills across such a wide variety of landscapes and terrains.

Alastair and Julie were not the only travellers attempting the route and they regularly came across familiar faces along the way, with some walkers travelling from around the world to complete this challenging walk, such is the draw of Alfred Wainwright. Alastair and Julie are now recovered from the strangest meteorological experiences thus far encountered on their many treks, twelve days of hot sunshine without a drop of rain! Planning is now underway for the next trip, probably in Spain. Good luck to both!


19th August

Dr Charles Reeves



The Chairman has already mentioned the wry humour to which we were treated by retired Doctor Charles Rees. His opening remark questioned the statement by the UK's Chief Medical Officers' that "there is no safe level of alcohol". On the one hand the Department of Health treats alcohol as though it is a Mercury compound and on the other, there is a colossal world-wide drinks industry. Where does the truth lie?

He presented his resulting comments against the backdrop of the widely accepted "J-shaped curve" for alcohol and mortality, which suggests that light-to-moderate drinkers have a lower risk of all-cause mortality than non-drinkers and a significantly lower risk than heavy drinkers.

The outcome of his talk – apart from the amusement brought about by his humorous approach – was that **the J Shaped Curve should guide the formulation of public policies on alcohol consumption**. By doing so, the UK would be shown up as the world's 'nanny state' when it comes to alcohol use and abuse.


INTERESTING OBSERVATION

4 The sport of choice for supervisors is CRICKET.




5 The sport of choice for middle management is TENNIS.
